- (10) What is the IPA and what is it used for?
- (11) What is a Swadesh list (what kind of words are on such a list) and what can it be used for?
- (12) What is and what characterizes a language documentation according to current standards?
- (13) What are metadata?
- (14) What is language revitalization?
- (15) Name three of Crystal's six prerequisites of language revitalization / survival and explain one of these with an example.
- (16) Explain the idea of a "language nest".
- (17) Name different forms how an endangered language can be learnt/taught/included in the education system.
- (18) Name four things/circumstances that are necessary for using an endangered language in education (for setting up classes).
- (19) Why is literacy important in revitalizing a language?
- (20) Name three ways how the prestige of an endangered language may be raised.
